Brighton Merged School Appointed Board Newsletter #1

Dear whānau, parents and caregivers

The Appointed Board of Trustees for the Brighton Merged School and North New Brighton School will be formally in place on 27 January 2014. In the interim we introduce six of the seven board trustees and give you an overview of our key tasks in 2014.

Communication

We will be putting out a newsletter regularly which will be available by email, as hard copy and will be published on the schools' websites. We will hold meetings and use email, facebook and other media to engage with the school and wider communities.

Key tasks for the board:

Establishing how we operate as a board: Agreeing on a code of conduct, meeting schedule, subcommittees, and North New Brighton operations in 2014

Planning: In consultation with the school community defining a school vision and developing a charter and policies

Principal appointment: Appointing a Principal by May 2014, with the position advertised nationally. The new Principal will then be responsible for developing a staffing plan for the new school and appointing staff.

School name: The interim name chosen by the Ministry of Education for our school is Brighton Merged School. A new name will be chosen in 2014 by the school community.

School development and new buildings: The new school will be completely rebuilt on the North New Brighton site, due for completion in January 2016. This will involve the preparation of a master plan, detailed design and construction.

In 2015 the merged school will operate from two sites at Freeville and North New Brighton. A decision will be made during 2014 how the school will be organised between the two sites.

Structure:

In 2014 the Boards of Trustees (BoT) of Freeville and Central New Brighton Schools will continue governing their schools. North New Brighton School BoT will not continue once the Appointed Board is in place on 27 January 2014. While discussion is still required, it is likely that a subcommittee of the Appointed Board comprising current BoT members, the Principal, and a staff representative will undertake the immediate operation of North New Brighton School. The subcommittee would report and make recommendations to the Appointed Board for decision making.
