Whanau Hui

Thank you to Maori whanau who attended our hui a couple of weeks ago. Despite the awfully cold weather we were delighted to have over 94 people in attendance, and the feedback and ideas expressed will give us some clear direction for where to next.

Timetable Tweaking

We are extremely fortunate to be part of a cluster of local schools being supported by Dr Kathleen Liberty, Associate Professor of the University of Canterbury School of Health Sciences. Since 2013 Dr Liberty has been researching the long term effects of natural disasters on young children, and helping schools to implement strategies to ensure that the school environment is kept as calm as possible.

Over time we will be implementing a number of her suggested strategies, once we have had time to upskill our teaching staff and our community has had an opportunity to learn more about Dr Liberty's work. However, when the new term begins there will be a couple of minor changes to our daily timetable at school. None of these will impact on the beginning or end of the school day.

Garden Fence Mural

A group of Year 7 & 8 artists (Tāne, Aka, Latreyl, Marshall, Dara, Bella, Mikayla, Josh C, Elliot, William B. Sean T) have been working with Anna-Belle Graham to create a mural on the fence surrounding the school garden. The artists have provided the following explanation for their design:

"Our design is based on the Māori Atua represented by the learning studios in our school. The Atua are Rongo ma tane, Papatuanuku, Haumia-tiketike, Tāne Mahuta, Tāwhirimatea and Tangaroa.

Our design represents our school, the music our art group listens to, the ties of friendship within our school, and the legendary bird that could have lived here. The sea animals represent Tangaroa, the penguin represents life, the waves represent the beach and us surfing, the Rāwhiti sun represents a new day and new things to learn, the school maunga represents the first one to touch the Rāwhiti sun with our learning. Seagulls represent the food because they steal our lunches, the trees represent Tāne Mahuta, kiwis for a Kiwi school, Tāwhirimatea helps his brother Tangaroa to make his sea move so the people can cross to find new discoveries.

The vibrant colours represent different personalities and cultures. Roots represent Rāwhiti, the trunk is the youth and the top is adults." It is wonderful to see our school grounds gradually come to life and represent us through the eyes of our children.

We now head into two weeks of rest and rejuvenation and, hopefully, the early winter bugs that have plagued both children and staff in the last few weeks will disappear without their usual breeding ground.

There is great excitement in my household as we are off to Cyprus for a family wedding. I will not be back until the third week of the new term.
