Those of you who had an association with Freeville School will know Iris well – she was a part of Freeville School from 1980 until its closure at the end of 2014. We wish to acknowledge the outstanding contribution of Iris Derham to education and to our community. Iris has spent many years as a teacher and educator - 38 of those years spent serving the Freeville and Rāwhiti school communities. The influence she has had on young lives and the families of young people has had an immeasurable reach, and she will be missed. We wish Iris a long, happy and well-earned retirement.

Vandalism

As many of you will have seen on our Facebook page, we were the victims of more senseless vandalism at the weekend with damage to our newly planted Rapuara play area, as well as the garage doors. Fortunatley we do have a significant number of security cameras monitoring our site and while they don't catch everything they do give us a pretty good idea as to who is here and at what times of the day – and night. We are greatly concerned by the number of quite young children who are here unsupervised after dark and sometimes well into the wee small hours. Those on site need to be aware that we do regularly provide security footage to the police.

We love having the wider community use our school grounds outside of school hours and consider you all to be part of our security team, so please do notify the police if you witness any vandalism or suspicious behaviour.

On Monday we hosted Grammy Award winning featured soloist and Maori musical instrument specialist Jerome Kavanagh. He shared his collection of traditional musical instruments, stories and songs with us. We appreciate your support in paying for the show. \$5.00 per family.

Here's what the tamariki of Ata Hapara had to say about the show:

- It was calming. The music made me feel really relaxed
- The purerehua sounded like a car engine and it was cool to watch. When it isn't spinning it doesn't make a sound, but when it spins then it sounds like the wind.
- You could feel the ihi.
- The instruments were made out of seaweed, whale teeth, gourds, wood, pupurangi shells, albatross (toroa) bone and pounamu.
- Some of the instruments were played by his nose, some he blew across the top of.
- Some of the instruments came from other places, like Alaska and Hawaii.





 He talked about the Maori goddess of music Hineraukatauri and shared stories about the music and how they relate to the instruments.
