Learning Conversations (Parent Interviews) for Years 2-8

We will be holding our first round of Learning Conversations between Tuesday 26th March and Thursday 28th March. A Learning Conversation is a conversation between the parent, the teacher and the child and is focused on everyone understanding what is happening at school for your child. A key part of the process is for your child to describe to you all of the different learning tasks he/she will be been involved in. A common thread throughout research states that children should understand their own learning goals and next steps. This helps children become self-regulated, and when children are self-regulating they can take control of their learning and become intrinsically motivated to improve.

Bookings for Learning Conversations are completed online by going to:

https://www.schoolinterviews.co.nz and the code is **kujdr**. If you don't have access to a computer feel free to contact Kim in the office to make a booking for you. Children in Rongo mā tane follow a slightly different reporting schedule and parents will be informed of this by the teaching team.

School Donations

Each year we ask for a donation from each family to supplement the money we receive from the Government and from local fundraising. For the first time in 5 years the Board of Trustees has increased the amount of the school donation to \$60 for one child and \$100 per family. Donations are tax deductible and the office can provide you with a receipt to make this claim.

So what does that amount actually look like? Over a 40 week school year a \$60 donation equates to \$1.50 a week, just 30 cents a day. For a family attending Rāwhiti School the donation amounts to \$2.50 per week, just 50 cents per day. While this might seem like an insignificant amount, your support in this way is crucial as we endeavour to provide an extraordinary environment and extraordinary experiences for our children. Your contributions are always used to enable us to maintain activities greater than the government grants are intended for. Thank you to those who regularly support the school by paying a school donation.

SeeSaw and Hapara—what are they?

On the school accounts you might see a transaction for SeeSaw or Hapara.

What is Seesaw?

Seesaw is a platform for student engagement. Teachers can empower students to create, reflect, share, and collaborate. Students "show what they know" using photos, videos, drawings, text, PDFs, and links. It's simple to get student work in one place and share with families, and nothing is shared without teacher approval.

At Rāwhiti School we use SeeSaw in Rongo mā tane, Papatūānuku, Ata Hāpara and for the Pasifika group.

In Papatūānuku (Year 3's only), Ata Hāpara (Year 4 to 8), Tāne mahuta, Tāwhirimātea and Tangaroa they use Hapara. Children in these studios have a gmail account.

Note Ata Hāpara are running both SeeSaw for all students and Hapara for Year's 4 to 8.

What is Hapara?

Hapara is a teacher dashboard for Y3-8 that allows easy sharing of work and assignments between students and teacher. It also allows teachers control over the digital space students are working in and helps provide a safer online environment for students to work in. As part of the programme they have access to a chromebook, Google drive, gmail school account, internet and a personal blog.

rewarding work.



Reading With Dogs At New Brighton Library

Do you have beginner readers needing a little something extra to help them on their reading journey? Libraries and schools around the world have found that by sitting down and reading to a friendly dog, a child's fear of being judged or laughed at over mistakes disappears. Over time, the child's reading ability and self-confidence improve and they begin to associate reading with a pleasant experience.

The Reading to Dogs program at New Brighton Library is designed to provide a relaxed, non-threatening atmosphere which encourages children to practise their reading skills and develop a love of reading.

The programme uses dogs who are the beloved pets of the Christchurch City Council Animal Management team. These furry friends have all been trained and tested for health, safety and temperament.

Our dogs:

- can increase a child's relaxation while reading
- listen attentively
- do not laugh, judge or criticise
- allow children to proceed at their own pace
- can be less intimidating than a child's peers

Library staff and a dog handler will be present at all times to help facilitate the sessions which are 15 minutes long. Children can bring a book from school or librarians can help them choose a book at the library.

The program is free and bookings are essential so caregivers can visit the library or ring 941-7780 to book a session.

Primary school and above – measles information for school newsletters/email from the Canterbury District Health Board

March 6 2019

Since 26 February 2019, the number of cases in the latest Canterbury measles outbreak has been steadily climbing and as at 5 March we have had ten confirmed cases, with more likely to be confirmed over the next days and weeks. Some are children who have yet to complete their MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) vaccinations, but four are adults aged between 27 and 50 who have had only one measles vaccination, which was standard practice between 1969 and 1990. Cases have now spread throughout Christchurch.

Measles is a serious and highly contagious, viral disease where up to 30 percent of those who catch it will develop complications – usually children under 5 and adults over the age of 20. Measles during pregnancy increases the risk of miscarriage, premature labour and low birth-weight in babies. Measles is spread through droplets in the air and through contact, so that anyone unprotected who has been in the same room as someone with measles will likely get it.

The surest protection is for people to have had both of their MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccinations, scheduled to be given to children at 15 months and at four years. As long as children of school age are up-to-date with their vaccinations they should be protected against measles. People vaccinated between 1969 and 1990 should contact their GP team who will provide a booster vaccination. People born before 1969 will have been exposed to measles and will be immune.

Family members who aren't sure if they have been immunised with two doses of MMR vaccine should talk to their GP team who will be able to provide a vaccination if they need it. An extra vaccination will not cause any harm.

Measles symptoms include:

- A respiratory type of illness with dry cough, runny nose, headache
- Temperature over 38.5 C and feeling very unwell
- o A red blotchy rash starts on day 4-5 of the illness usually on the face and moves to the chest and arms.

If you think a child at your school has measles, keep them away from other children until they can be collected and taken home. If they are already sick they should stay home for at least five days after symptoms such as a rash appeared. Once measles has been in your school, parents of any children who are not fully immune (2 doses of MMR) are advised to keep them home for 14 days from the likely date of exposure.
