

#### From The Principal continued ...

I am looking forward to spending Monday at Rāpaki Marae with some of our Year 4 students, who will be having their first overnight stay as part of our EOTC programme.

Something else for you to look forward to is the **Te Ahi Ora 'Fire Spinning' demonstration here at school on September 12th from 6-7pm.** The Te Ahi Ora team will be working alongside some of our classes on September 5th and 12th, teaching <u>non-fire</u> lessons to students, providing new ways for them to learn and connect with each other. We encourage parents to come along and watch our children perform on September 12th, and even to learn alongside them. This is a pivotal part of the programme, where we get to put the lessons throughout the day into play with the real deal. Thanks to Creative New Zealand, we are able to provide Te Ahi Ora to your community free of charge.

#### **Returning to school following illness**

While Covid is not causing us as many problems as it did last term, we are still dealing with all of the usual childhood illnesses. We are regularly asked when a child can return to school following an illness.

The Ministry of Health has confirmed that the guidance for returning to schools following vomiting or diarrhoea has not changed. If a child is free of those symptoms for 48 hours, they can attend school again.

- If a child has been unwell with a respiratory illness other than COVID-19, they can return to school 24 hours after they have significantly improved and are behaving/eating normally.
- Following vomiting or <u>diarrhoea</u>, a child should be symptom free for 48 hours before they
  can return.
- If they still have a runny nose or dry cough without any other symptoms such as a fever, vomiting or <u>diarrhoea</u>, then they are unlikely to be infectious and can be considered well enough to attend school.

#### **Cycle Safety**

If your child rides their bike to school, please remind them about safety on the roads. We regularly receive messages from concerned motorists who have been involved in a 'near miss' when a child has pulled out in front of them without looking behind them, or signalling that they are turning.

We have cycle safety lessons here each year, but children also need regular reminders about being safe on the roads.



#### **Last Chance To Get Your Bread Tags in!**



Have you noticed that cardboard bread tags are very quickly replacing plastic bread tags here in Aotearoa?

This is great news for the environment, but that does mean that soon

Bread Tags for Wheelchairs won't have any plastic bread tags coming in for us to recycle.

Therefore, from 1 September 2022 the bread tag collection point at Rawhiti School office will be removed.

Please ensure you drop your collection of bread tags in before this date.

Where possible please separate the bread tags by colour, remove any stickers, rubbish or dirty/rusty bread tags - you'll make the collection point volunteer's day!

Nga mihi nui kia koutou for all your support!

We are all volunteers, and together, we have all made such huge differences in the quality of many wheelchair recipients lives, as well as keeping bread tags out of landfill.

Reminder - at the Rawhiti School office collection point – We do not accept cardboard bread tags.

Cardboard bread tags can be recycled in your yellow kerbside bins. It is highly recommended that the cardboard bread tags be consolidated before being put into your yellow bin. There are many simple ways of doing this. The easiest is to put them in an envelope, which you then seal before it adding to your recycling, or you could wrap them up in newspaper. That way they will not fall out and get blown off the recycling processor belt.

From 1st September 2022 the Taupini Hangarua (recycling centre) in the Rawhiti School office will only be a collection area for:

Year 5/6 camp in Oct/Nov has been added to your account because you may find it easier to make smaller payments between now and then.




#### **School Photos**
