Learning Conversations

Bookings are now open for the upcoming Learning Conversations on Sept 5th, 6th and 7th. Learning Conversations are one of the ways that we communicate with parents about their child's learning.

A Learning Conversation is a meeting run by the student for his or her parents/caregivers, entirely focused on the student's recent learning. During the Learning Conversation the student presents work in different curriculum areas, discussing the process of learning and the progress made to date.

The purpose of Learning Conversations is for students to display learner agency (ownership of their learning) and to help them take personal responsibility for their progress. It is a chance for them to share their learning journey with whanau (family) and friends. In the traditional parent-teacher conference, students were "third parties" to assessment, hearing about their progress through the grapevine of teachers and parents.

Developing students' ability to reflect on and talk about their learning and their progress makes a difference. We believe that student involvement in the conferences makes learning more active, provides better opportunities for students to evaluate their performance, and encourages students to accept greater responsibility for their learning. Having students take charge of the conference makes them more accountable for what they are learning. This principle is consistent with effective pedagogy and assessment within in the New Zealand Curriculum.

How do the Learning Conversations work? Learning Conversations are for 30 minutes. Multiple student lead conversations will be held at the same time in your child's studio. You will be involved in a variety of activities during the time — looking at samples of learning, doing an activity to support learning, talking about goals and what your child, you and the teacher might do to support these goals, looking at work around the classroom. During the Learning Conversation, your child's teacher/s will spend some time with you. This time will allow the teacher to expand on the information your child has shared or for you to clarify something if necessary.

Covid 19

We have certainly had our share of winter illness over the last couple of weeks, with absence numbers back up at 2022 levels with over 100 away each day. Staff sickness has also been high, which is very challenging for us due to the lack of day relief teachers available to call on.

Since the beginning of August we have had 23 new Covid cases reported. You will no doubt be aware that the regulation requiring a 7 day isolation period for those who have tested positive for Covid, was lifted at 12.01am on Tuesday morning.

While the regulation has changed, the **recommendations** have not. It is recommended those who test positive for Covid do not attend work or school for a period of 5 days, or longer if they are still feeling symptomatic or unwell. This is in the interests of public health.

As always we would advise that if your child is unwell - with Covid or any other seasonal illness - that they stay at home until they are symptom free to help contain any spread.

Cellphones at School

The issue of cellphones at school hit the media last week, prompting several of you to ask what is the approach here at Rāwhiti. We understand that many of you send children to school with a personal cell phone to make communication easier in the event of an emergency. Children who bring cell phones to school do so at their own risk. The school does not accept responsibility for any loss or damage.

Phones are not to be used to communicate with others or connect to social media during the school day. Phones are to be away, out of sight - preferably in a school bag. Students are welcome to hand their cellphone to their teachers for safe keeping during the day and we have lockable facilities in each learning studio.

If there is an urgent need for communication that cannot wait until the end of the school day, students and parents can make contact through the school office. Children must ask a teacher before contacting parents using their cellphone. We request that parents do not phone their children directly during the school day.

Our students must not use the Internet, email, mobile phones or any ICT equipment to be mean, rude, offensive, or to bully, harass, or in any way harm anyone else connected to our school, or the school itself, even if it is meant as a 'joke.'

If your child has been misusing their cellphone at school you will be notified and asked to work with us on a reasonable solution.

Board of Trustees Strategic Planning

In the past it's been the board's responsibility to create annual school charters. These were key documents that informed the school's leadership of where we were headed as a kura, and the values we hoped to instil in our students along the way. There are new planning and reporting requirements that came into effect in January 2023 and schools are required to create new strategic plans under the new framework by 1 January 2024. This year we are beginning the work to create our new strategic plan, with an annual implementation plan flowing directly from this in 2024.

Over the next year, the Board is going to be asking you all some questions to help them set the schools direction.

To get the ball rolling throughout the week of September 4th-8th - which happens to coincide with the Learning Conversations and the PTA Book Fair. we are going to be asking you to rate our current goals to see if they are still relevant to you, if any major change is needed, or if they are even understandable. Those goals are:

Our Learners: The RISE values and dispositions are the focus of our curriculum. We will know we have been successful when our learners are engaged and supported in learning that is relevant, challenging, and accessible to all.

Our Staff: Enhanced hauora for our staff. We will know we have been successful when our staff are well equipped to respond positively to workplace challenges and opportunities in ways that maintain and promote wellbeing.

Our Community: Strong partnerships with our community. We will know we have been successful when our community contributes to, understands, and supports the learning and culture of Rāwhiti School.

Mindfulness

We are going to start sharing with you the content of the Mindfulness sessions that happen here at school in each Learning Studio, led by Erica from Mindful Schools. You'll find this info in the School Notices section of the newsletter, along with some suggestions from Erica for reinforcing this learning at home. From time to time we seek feedback from the children about what impact, if any, these sessions are having. Here are some recent comments from Year 3-6 students:

- "I have learnt ways to take deep breaths and I have also learnt how to control my stress so I don't freak out."
- "Something that I have always struggled on is thinking before doing and this really helped. I still am not the best at it but baby steps!"
- "I have learnt to ask for help from a teacher when I think an argument is going to happen."
- "I learnt to breathe in and out and I have learnt that when you are annoyed that you can do mindfulness."
- "There are no bad feelings and even if things don't go your way it's ok."

Visit to Art Gallery & Tūranga



Last week the group working with Lisa Harding, the weaver working with us through Creatives in Schools, went into the city to get design inspiration for their project. The group looked at the woven tile mats Ngā Whāriki Manaaki that are positioned along the river and at Victoria Square, and at the tukutuku panels on display at Tūranga. The group also visited the Art Gallery to view Te Rā, the 200-year-old Māori sail that is on loan from the British

museum. The group was fascinated with the very fine weaving and how it was constructed. They were also interested in the kāhu and kererū feathers and dog-skin, which were integrated into the design and are seen as highly prized materials in te ao Māori and symbols of status.

Mindfulness: Riding the Waves of Emotions

This week in our mindfulness lessons we learned how our emotions are like waves throughout our day. We may be calm one moment, but the next moment something happens and we're into a big emotion.

We learned that this is normal and that we can learn how to surf those waves. When we stop and notice our emotions, we learn that we don't have to get stuck in them. Mindfulness helps us pay attention to what is happening right now with kindness and curiosity, not judging, berating, or condemning.

You can reinforce this lesson at home by practicing with your child and asking these questions:

- How are emotions like a wave?
- What emotions are like the top part of a wave, and what emotions are on the bottom?

Bed time: Perhaps talk with your child about all the emotions they experienced that day—not judging them, just noticing them.

In the community: Riding on the bus or in a car with your child, help them look for emotions in other people—just noticing, not judging—and see if they have ever felt that way.
