## Ka Ora, Ka Ako - Healthy School Lunches

The free school lunch programme, Ka Ora, Ka Ako – Healthy School Lunches, was launched by the Labour government in 2019 with the aim of reducing food insecurity, and "putting students in a good place to learn". Since 2021 students attending Rāwhiti School have had access to this scheme and we have worked effectively with our provider, Compass Group, to create a menu that seems to suit our children, which has in turn reduced waste.

The Associate Education Minister is now reviewing the free school lunches programme ahead of Budget 2024 in May and has stated he wants to cut the programme by up to 50 per cent.

This causes me - and I am sure many of you - great concern. None of us here at school like the idea of offering a free lunch programme that is only available to those who can somehow prove they are poor.

Can I link the free school lunches programme to increased attendance or achievement? Of course I can't. Attendance and engagement are influenced by a broad range of factors, not just free lunches.

However, since 2020 there have been a number of evaluations conducted in different regions and each has concluded that free lunches have contributed to happier and healthier students. We know that here at Rāwhiti, the first thing we noticed was a significant drop-off in the numbers of children presenting at the office in the early afternoons saying that they 'felt sick'. What we frequently found was that these children were hungry, having not had anything to eat since breakfast time.

Yesterday the MP for Christchurch East, Reuben Davidson, visited us at school at lunch time to see the lunches programme in action. He commented on the lovely sense of community that was evident in each learning studio, with the children sitting together, socialising over food. What also stands out here is that there are no children missing out on lunch.

## **Learning Conversations - Term 2**

We would normally have a round of Learning Conversations (aka parent-teacher interviews) at the end of Term 1. In response to some feedback that we gathered last year, we are going to make some changes to our Learning Conversations, and in order to work on that we are going to postpone these until later in the year. You will get more information early in Term 2.

The mornings are definitely feeling more like Autumn than Summer and so we would like to remind



parents that children are not allowed into the school grounds any earlier than 8.30am. We would prefer that children walk, bike or use their scooters to get to school and time their arrival for after 8.30am. There is no need for them to wait outside the gate unless they come to school too early. If you are dropping your children at school before 8.30am they are required to wait outside the school gate, and will not be actively supervised.
