These are visible on the Hero app and are emailed out on a regular basis. School pays for some activities and we are permitted to charge children for some activities. School pays for things like technology instruction for Year 7-8, camp activities, William Pike registration, a portion of the Friday sport fee.

Payment by caregivers is required for extracurricular activities including school camp transport, accommodation and food, basketball, technology materials fee, Children's University, Dancing Like The Stars, E-Pro8, touch rugby, William Pike activities and ICAS exams/Kiwi competitions etc. We encourage families to set up a regular payment so that significant costs can be spread over time. 


#### Hero Posts

#### Uniform

Now it is getting colder please remember that our uniform is a purple polar fleece or black senior jacket (Y7&8). Students may wear a black or white thermal underneath their polo shirt if they need an additional layer. Children will be asked to remove non-regulation sweatshirts or other non-uniform items. We don't have a uniform jacket so children may wear whatever jacket they have to school and in the playground if they are cold. Our classrooms are warm so children will not need to wear their jackets inside.





#### **ICAS entry information and Form**

Students in Year 3-8 have the opportunity to enter the following competitions run by the University of New South Wales. You can find more information at <u>icasassessments.com</u>. All ICAS Assessments are completed as online tests, designed to recognise and reward academic excellence. The ICAS Assessments series is designed to assess your students' ability to apply classroom learning in new contexts, using higher-order thinking and problem-solving skills. The students will sit the online assessment here at school, in Weeks 3-6 of Term 3, 2024.

The school will subsidise the entry fees (Full cost = \$21.50 for each assessment) so that you will only need to pay \$15 towards each of the competitions. As this is an optional activity, the full payment is required before a test will be ordered for your child. Entries must be received by Friday 26 July either via this google form or the paper form handed out in studios.
