#### Y4 Noho Marae

Each year our Year 4 students have an overnight experience with a Noho Marae. This year the Y4s from Tāwhirimātea, Tane Mahuta and Āta Hapara stayed at Rāpaki Marae. When they arrived they were formally welcomed in a ceremony called a pōwhiri. Matua Issac talked about the special artworks, carvings and tukutuku panels in the wharenui. He also told them about how to be respectful of marae tikanga, like not wearing shoes or taking food into the wharenui. They had a great time doing lots of activities such as walking to the beach, weaving, drawing the ancestors on the pou, making rākau and singing waiata.



#### Cantamath

Last week Eliza, Zita, Travis & Archie represented Rāwhiti at the 51st Cantamath competition, held at Wolfbrook Arena. The team did well placing in the top ten, scoring 70/100 points, while racing against the 82 other teams in the Year 7 event. We also had a number of students achieve Highly Commended for the quality of their work in the CantaMath projects section: Travis (poster), Vinny (poster) & Joel (game).



## Y7/8 Ski Trip

Our Year 7 & 8 students had a day at Mt Hutt Ski Field earlier this week. While the weather looked less than appealing when they first arrived, it soon cleared up and students enjoyed a beautiful day on the mountain. After a lesson, students were able to spend the rest of the day practising and challenging themselves in the new environment. A number of our more experienced students were able to share their knowledge and skills with their peers.

## **Children's University Outreach Visit**

Last week our Children's University students were fortunate to have students from the University of Canterbury's Earth and Environment Science faculty out to run a session. Our students used microscopes to observe and identify species of organisms that had been collected in leaf litter from Hagley Park and the West Coast.



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## Back-a-Book Challenge:
