We have had another busy few weeks. Athletics day was fun and great to see so many children participating and giving it their best. Congratulations to all those who made it through to the Eastern Zone competition and those who found success there and have made it to the Canterbury athletics competition. The Year 1 - 3 athletics is coming up on 18th November.





Our students recently took part in a learning experience connected to **SCAPE Public Art**, Christchurch's annual outdoor art event that brings large-scale contemporary artworks into everyday city spaces. SCAPE showcases works from local and international artists, turning streets, parks, and public areas into open-air galleries. Students

discussed how art can connect people, tell stories, and transform public spaces. They then entered a competition where they had the opportunity to bring their art to life. Two of our students were chosen and attended Matatiki Hornby Library, where they brought their art work to life. Congratulations to Koa (Tāne Mahuta) and Eliza (Tangaroa) who have art work on display at Tūranga (Christchurch Central Library).

Thank you all for your support over the strike day. We appreciate your messages of support for teachers and support staff, and your understanding of the challenges our education system is facing. You may have seen news reports over the last few weeks about the new Mathematics and English curriculum and the draft curriculum for other learning areas. While these changes will take us some time to fully understand and implement, what has not changed is the great teaching that happens every day at Rāwhiti School. Our staff are dedicated to planning great lessons that help children progress in their learning. Zone Athletics

Tuesday 4th November saw 66 children head to Rāwhiti domain to the New Brighton Athletics club to attend the Eastern Zone athletics day. These tamariki had done extremely well at our school athletics day and qualified for the zones.

The weather was very warm for the day and all those involved did extremely well competing against the other schools in our zone. There are now 20 children from Rāwhiti school that have qualified for Canterbury's which will be held on Wednesday 26th November at Ngā Puna Wai.

Attendance

Regular school attendance is crucial for a student's academic success and overall well-being. When students are present and on time, they are better able to engage with lessons, build relationships with peers and teachers, and stay on track with their learning.

Student Attendance Expectations

Our primary expectation is that all students attend school every day unless there is a valid reason for absence.

- Be Present: Consistent attendance ensures students don't miss essential classroom instruction, group activities, or important announcements.
- Be on Time: Students should arrive punctually to class, ready to learn. Lateness disrupts instruction for everyone.
- Late Arrivals: Must sign in on the vistab tablet at the office.

Reporting an Absence: What Parents Need to Do

We understand that students will occasionally need to miss school due to illness or other unavoidable reasons. When an absence occurs, **parents/guardians must notify the school office before the start of the school day** (e.g., before 9:00 AM).

When you contact the school, please provide the following details:

- 1. Student's Full Name and Class
- 2. Date(s) of the Absence
- 3. **The specific reason** for the absence (e.g., fever, doctor's appointment, family emergency). It is important that you provide a reason because we have to code absences differently for different reasons. If you do not contact school or you do not provide a reason your child will be marked as **Truant**.

How to Report:

- •Hero app: Make a notification in the Hero app (preferred method)
- •Call: 3889519 and leave a message on the answer phone
- •School website: There is a form on the front page of our school website.
- •Email: admin@rawhiti.school.nz

Please note: Absences will be marked as **unexplained** until the school receives notification from a parent/ guardian explaining the reason. Consistent unexplained absences may require follow-up with the school administration.

Thank you for partnering with us to ensure your child has the best possible learning experience. Consistent attendance truly makes a difference!



Measles

- Measles is circulating and is very contagious. There is now measles in Northland, Auckland, Manawatu, Nelson and Wellington, and we expect further cases across New Zealand.
- Watch out for symptoms fever, cough, runny nose, sore eyes, and a blotchy rash:





- Anyone with measles symptoms must stay at home and should seek urgent advice by ringing their doctor or Healthline on 0800 611 116.
- Anyone who is closely exposed to a measles case must stay at home. Heath New Zealand will provide individuals with advice on a case-by-case basis (including when they can leave quarantine at home).
- Health New Zealand is actively working with the schools that currently have measles cases.
- People are considered immune to measles after having two doses of a measles vaccine from

12 months or older, or if you have had measles before. For more information on measles immunity visit:

Overdue Accounts

At Rāwhiti School we try hard to keep costs for activities to a minimum. School pays for, or significantly subsidises, much of the cost for extra activities. We do not charge for activities directly related to curriculum learning. We also do not charge for trips in our school vans. We are allowed to charge for things like camp, transport for school trips (when we need a bus), extra curricular sport like basketball and Koru Games, optional activities like "Dancing like the Stars", EPro8 competitions, ICAS tests etc, and the take home materials cost for Year 7 and 8 technology. At the moment we have \$16,000 of overdue balances. Cheryl emailed accounts out last week and we would appreciate you making payment to clear what is owed. You can always see your current balance owed on the Hero app or contact Cheryl in the office and she will help you.

We encourage families to set up a regular automatic payment. If you paid \$5 a fortnight from the time your child starts school you would be close to paying for every extra activity your child might want to participate in. Some families pay \$5 or \$10 a week and this more than covers any extra cost. Some even get a refund in Year 8.

We also understand that for some families any cost is a challenge. Rather than your children missing out on extra activities we encourage you to come and talk with us so that we can work out a payment plan or help you find funding from other sources.


